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# Construction projects Public works and State and federal wage decisions

Since summer is a time when many agencies focus on infrastructure improvements, I would like to provide some information on procurement and contracting requirements specific to construction. To begin, what is defined as construction? The procurement code sets forth that "Construction" means building, altering, repairing, installing or demolishing in the ordinary course of business any:

- · road, highway, bridge, parking area or related project;
- · building, stadium or other structure;
- · airport, subway or similar facility;
- · park, trail, athletic field, golf course or similar facility;
- · dam, reservoir, canal, ditch or similar facility;
- · sewage or water treatment facility, power generating plant, pump station, natural gas compressing station or similar facility;
- · sewage, water, gas or other pipeline;
- · transmission line:
- · radio, television or other tower;
- · water, oil or other storage tank;
- · shaft, tunnel or other mining appurtenance;
- · electrical wiring, plumbing or plumbing fixture, gas piping, gas appliances or water conditioners;
- · air conditioning conduit, heating or other similar mechanical work; or
- · similar work, structures or installations.
- · leveling or clearing land;

- · excavating earth;
- · drilling wells of any type, including seismographic shot holes or core drilling;
- · similar work, structures or installations.

Per state law, construction projects shall be classified as a **local public works project** if the school/agency uses professional architectural or engineering services costing fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or more or professional landscape architectural or surveying services costing ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) or more, excluding tax.

The New Mexico Public Works Minimum Wage Act applies to employers and employees working on state and locally funded public works construction projects. Public works projects, and all state or locally funded construction projects costing more than \$60,000, are covered by the Act and requires a wage decision to be obtained and specific wage rates to be paid under the project. The New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions (NMDWS) Labor Relations Division sets the minimum wage rates for all Public Works projects each year and is responsible for issuing wage decisions. What is a Wage decision? A state wage decision is the wage rates set for a public works project, or any publicly funded construction project valued above \$60,000. Whenever federal funding is used for construction, a federal wage determination will usually be required. The contracting agency is responsible for requesting a wage decision, either from NMDWS by submitting a request that describes the scope of work and other project information or pursuant to federal funding requirements.

PRIOR to awarding a contract for construction valued over \$60,000 an agency must also verify that the contractor is registered properly with the NMDWS. Bidding documents shall include clear notification that each contractor, prime contractor or subcontractor is required to be registered through the NMDWS and should also contain the wage decision information so bidders know what the required wages will be. (Note this does *not* apply to vocational classes in public schools or to public post-secondary educational institutions.)

Although ACES hasn't ventured into the world of offering contracts specific to construction just yet (looks like it's on the horizon) we do currently offer contracts which at times may cover work classified as construction, such as contract ITB 22-001 for On-Call and Preventative Maintenance Facilities Services (HVAC/Plumbing/Electrical and Refrigeration).
